Critical Thinking and Artificial Intelligence

Artificial intelligence has become an inseparable companion in our lives. For many, it is almost like another member of the family—a kind of digital “grandparent” we turn to for quick answers, instant wisdom, and immediate solutions. In the past, we sought out the elders of the tribe to understand the world. Today, we look to a virtual box of algorithms and data for guidance on what to think, what to do, and how to do it.

New generations are growing up surrounded by devices that hold all imaginable information. Communication has become impersonal, and the need to reason, debate, or even question what is presented to us has significantly diminished. In academia, AI does the homework, solves equations, summarizes books, and even structures essays.

The concerning part is not the use of AI itself, but our passive attitude toward it: we accept its answers without analysis, reflection, or adapting them to our own reality. Instead of fostering critical thinking, we are creating automatic replicas of ideas that are not our own.

In the past, when we turned to our grandparents for quick solutions, we often left with more questions than answers. They challenged us to explore multiple perspectives, to consider causes and consequences, to weigh pros and cons. All of this was enriched by their lived experience, their beliefs, culture, and history. This complex and enriching mental exercise is what we now call critical thinking.

Critical thinking is not innate—it is learned. It is cultivated at home, developed in classrooms, sharpened in debates, expanded through reading, and strengthened by contrasting theories. It allows us to discern between what is useful and what is superficial, to argue our beliefs with clarity, and to understand the perspectives of others. It is the art of building personal judgment in a world overwhelmed with information.

Today, the real challenge is not choosing between critical thinking and artificial intelligence, but learning how to integrate them consciously and ethically. AI should be a tool in service of analysis, not an unquestionable oracle. We must move beyond the habit of “copy and paste” and start to question, deepen, and enrich the answers we receive. We must treat it as just another source to consult, not the ultimate truth.

Only then can we shape individuals capable of thinking independently, of building knowledge rather than merely reproducing it, and of leading in a society where thinking for oneself will be, more than ever, a revolutionary act.

**Saturday, June 14 Flag Day 2025
in United States**



People across the United States celebrate Flag Day on June 14 each year to honor the United States flag and to commemorate the flag's adoption. On the same day, the United States Army celebrates its birthday. On June 14, 1777, the Continental Congress replaced the British symbols of the Grand Union flag with a new design featuring 13 white stars on a field of blue and 13 red and white stripes—one for each state. Although the Philadelphia seamstress Betsy Ross is popularly attributed with designing this early version of the flag, historians generally point to Francis Hopkinson as the creator. Hopkinson was a delegate from New Jersey and one of the signers of the Declaration of Independence. The number of stars increased as the new states entered the Union, but the number of stripes stopped at 15 and was later returned to 13. In June 1886 Bernard Cigrand made his first public proposal for the annual observance of the birth of the flag when he wrote an article titled "The Fourteenth of June" in the old Chicago Argus newspaper. Cigrand's effort to ensure national observance of Flag Day finally came when President Woodrow Wilson issued a proclamation calling for a nationwide observance of the event on June 14, 1916. However, Flag Day did not become official until August 1949, when President Harry Truman signed the legislation and proclaimed June 14 as Flag Day. In 1966, Congress also requested that the President issue annually a proclamation designating the week in which June 14 occurs as National Flag Week.
